Letter from the Superintendent

Greetings! It's hard to believe we've already been at it for almost a month. Students and staff are settling into their new schedules and education is in full swing.

Since the pandemic began the nation has seen an uptick in negative student behaviors and absenteeism, unfortunately White Lake School is no exception. I am reaching out for parent support. It is paramount, not only at elementary, but at all educational levels, that our students are in attendance regularly. Lost time in the classroom does affect student achievement, as one would expect. Please help limit student absences as much as possible this school year. In terms of student behaviors, we are once again utilizing Sam Booth's services to help address this issue in the school. She is a certified counselor in which we are funding through our ESSER COVID relief funds. Unfortunately, it sounds like negative behaviors are also more prevalent out in the community and at home as well. I would ask you to take this problem very seriously and work with various support systems to help address this growing concern. Please feel free to contact the school if you need any help in this area.

As was mentioned at the August School Board meeting, our district was identified as a Special Education Results Driven Accountability (RDA) Level 3 district, meaning we will be receiving some supports from the State to help improve in these special education areas. I am quite certain that attendance has also played an impact in this status.

In October, the State report card will be released. This year the State has made a few changes to how accountability is calculated. One being, only one year (SY2021-2022) of assessment data, rather than the typical three years, will be used to calculate the Student Performance indicator (SPI). With this change, I would expect at least of our schools to be listed as not meeting that target, mainly due to a subgroups attendance rate and that group's performance. The various subgroups include students with disabilities, English language learners, migrants, etc. Since we are an RDA school, I would also suspect a targeted assistance designation. That information will be available mid-October at http://doe.sd.gov/reportcard/. Regardless of our status, we will continue to work hard to ensure all our students receive a quality education.

Lastly, next week will be a busy week with all the homecoming festivities. Please make sure to show your school spirit and continue supporting our kids and school.

2nd and 3rd Grades

How is it already the middle of September!? We have been in full swing for a month now and have made a great transition into the school year!

The 3rd graders have adjusted well to their "new" math series, having to copy from the text book. The 2nd graders have spent their math time mostly review basic adding/subtracting facts. Most of the remainder of this first chapter for them is reading story problems and finding key words to help them decide whether to add or subtract.

In English, we are studying sentences and the parts that make a whole sentence. In social studies, we learned the names/locations of the 7 continents and 5 oceans (Yes, 5- Southern Ocean!) In science, we are using an online curriculum composed of videos and hands on activities. So far, the kids are loving it! We are learning about plant reproduction and why bees are so important!

In reading we have studied dictionary skills and are now working on the forms of figurative language. We will then start diving into a study of all the main reading skills we need to know as 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} graders.

We were able to take part in South Dakota Largest Classroom at the State Fair, and it was a great experience for everyone! Next week is Homecoming with an 11:30 dismissal on Friday!

Skills that will be learned, practiced, and demonstrated include plant life, ecosystems, and living/nonliving parts of an environment.

Though we just started, we have gotten lots done! One thing to keep an eye on in the second semester is our annual Living Wax Museum Presentation. We will be aiming to do this in May. This year, students have picked out an influential American to society. Students spend the year conducting research, writing, and practicing for this presentation. When the date arrives, the students love to see people from the community come and support them!


